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Getting or spreading coronavirus in common use high traffic areas, such as, club house, toilet facilities, entry/exit points, changing areas and other communal areas eg Seated or covered Standing areas	Employees Customers Spectators Delivery drivers	Identify: - areas where people will congregate eg club house, beer garden, tea points etc - For Changing Areas, see separate Risk Assessment GRA 02 v1.0 dated August 2020 - Usage of Dressing Room Facilities - areas where there are pinch points meaning people can't meet social distancing rules eg narrow entrances/exits, customer service points, storage areas - areas and equipment where people will touch the same surfaces, and equipment, such as bar and kitchen eg drink dispensing, till points etc - areas and surfaces that are frequently touched but are difficult to clean • Agree the combination of controls you will put in place to reduce the risks: • limiting the number of people in rooms so that social distancing rules can be met • reorganise facilities in communal areas such as spacing out or reducing tables etc so social distancing rules can be met • where possible, install physical impervious barriers (perspex in bar area) to reduce contact • introduce a one-way system around the facility or regularly used pedestrian routes to manage people flow, and to encourage social distancing	 Put in place monitoring and supervision to make sure people are following controls put in place eg following hygiene procedures, washing or sanitising hands, following one-way systems Adopting the EvePass Track & Trace scheme on entry or the Government approved NHS QR System for ALL persons entering the ground. Paper system to be continued in event of non-mobile holders Face Masks to be worn by ALL persons entering the ground. 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	 wherever possible leave non-fire doors open to reduce the amount of door conduct and also potentially improve ventilation provide hand sanitiser at accessible places near to where people will have contact with high traffic areas eg entrance/exit erect signs to remind people to wash or sanitise their hands and not to touch their faces initiate a cleaning regime to ensure high traffic communal areas are kept clean - consider frequency, level of cleaning and who should be doing it 	ANY PERSON REFUSING TO COMPLY WITH THESE FACE MASK REQUIREMENTS WILL BE ASKED TO LEAVE THE CLUB / GROUND		

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Getting or spreading coronavirus by not cleaning surfaces or equipment	Employees Customers Spectators Delivery drivers	 identify surfaces that are frequently touched by many people (often common areas) eg handrails, door handles, shared equipment etc and specify the frequency and level of cleaning and by whom train people how to put on and remove personal protective equipment (PPE) and how to keep it clean reduce the need for people to move around unnecessarily if possible. This will reduce the potential spread of any contamination through touched surfaces avoid sharing work equipment if possible eg tills, card machines etc or put cleaning regimes in place to clean between each user identify where you can reduce the contact of people with surfaces eg leaving doors open, providing contactless payment, using electronic documents identify other areas that will need cleaning to prevent the spread of coronavirus eg kitchen, bar area, rest rooms etc. Specify the frequency and level of cleaning and who will do it identify what cleaning products are needed (eg surface wipes, detergents and water) and where they should be used. keep surfaces clear to make it easier to clean and reduce the likelihood of contaminating objects provide more bins and empty more regularly 	- put in place monitoring and supervision to make sure people are following controls, ie are implementing the cleaning regimes implemented - provide information telling people who needs to clean and when provide instruction and training to people who need to clean. include: > products they need to use > precautions they need to follow > areas they need to clean - identify how you are going to replenish cleaning products	Appointed Covid-19 Officer Duty Manager staff member	6th October 2020

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Mental health and wellbeing affected through isolation or anxiety about coronavirus	Employees	 talk openly with employees about the possibility that they could become affected and tell them what to do to raise concerns or who to go to so that they can talk things through involve employees in completing risk assessments so they can help identify potential problems and identify solutions keep employees updated on what is happening so they feel involved and reassured discuss the issue of fatigue with employees and make sure they can take regular breaks, and set working hours to ensure they aren't working long hours 	- share information and advice with employees about mental health and wellbeing - consider occupational health referral if personal stress and anxiety issues are identified	Appointed Covid-19 Officer Duty Manager staff member Board member (Chairman)	6th October 2020

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Contracting or spreading the virus by not social distancing	Employees Customers Spectators Delivery drivers	Identify places where, under normal circumstances, employees would not be able to maintain social distancing rules identify how you can keep people apart in line with social distancing rules in the first instance. This may include: using marker tape on the floor one-way systems holding virtual meetings to avoid work place limiting the number of people on site at one time identify where it isn't possible to meet social distancing rules and identify other physical measures to separate people eg physical screens and splash barriers, place markers on the floor to indicate where people should stand and the direction they should face if it isn't possible to meet social distancing rules and physical measures can't be used then put in place other measures to protect people: enhanced cleaning regimes increase in hand washing or sanitising limiting the amount of people improving ventilation display signs to remind people to socially distance	 put in place arrangements to monitor and supervise to make sure social distancing rules are followed provide information, instruction and training to people to understand what they need to do provide signage and ways to communicate to non-employees what they need to do to maintain social distancing All club staff will be required to wear Face Visors that have been supplied to them All Club staff to monitor gatherings of persons, both inside the clubhouse, Beer Garden, and around the pitch, to ensure there are no more than 6 persons together at any one time, and then at least two metres from anyone else. Poor ventilation leading to risks of coronavirus spreading	Employees Customers Visitors	 identify if you need additional ventilation to increase air flow in all or parts of your workplace fresh air is the preferred way of ventilation so opening windows and doors can help if you need additional ventilation, provide it eg mechanical ventilation, desk fans etc 	- maintain air circulation	Appointed Covid-19 Officer Duty Manager staff member	6th October 2020

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Increased risk of infection and complications for vulnerable workers	Employees	 identify who in your work force fall into one of the following categories: clinically extremely vulnerable people self isolating people with symptoms of coronavirus discuss with employees what their personal risks are and identify what you need to do in each case identify how and where someone in one of these categories will work in line with current government guidance if they are coming into work, identify how you will protect them through social distancing and hygiene procedures where people choose to wear face coverings you should support them.
