The Midfielder will undoubtedly add a spark to Tim Sills' side this side this campaign, with his impressive skill and desire usually a key factor in matchday success. We caught up with Buckler this week, to discuss all things Hammers...

What's been your biggest, football related difficulty over the last few months and during lockdown?

For me personally I thought lockdown was a bit of a blessing, unlike many others I haven't had any football related difficulties because I found that with the pause in normal personal/ work life,

I've been able to dedicate more attention to football and give it my full commitment in preparation for the new season.

Did you find it difficult joining Hamworthy while a pandemic raged, and how have you settled in?

A fourth consecutive league win could push Hamworthy up to third in the standings.

Their North Dorset visitors however have generally given the Hammers a tough fight, and would no doubt be looking to turn the corner after an indifferent start to the campaign, having taking only 3 points from 15 available. For the third successive game United boss Tim Sills not surprisingly started with the same eleven.

A decent County Ground crowd of 103, at our first home game since the opening day of the season, were hoping to see both the quality of football and results that the Hammers had been producing of late on the road.

Hamworthy did not disappoint. Jamie Beasley saw an early cross-come-shot hit the woodwork. That apart, although the hosts were full of ideas, these were just not coming off, with a tendency to overhit the final ball.

That all changed on 20 minutes with a goal of some class. Declan Randall on the right played the ball across to Dan Cann, who then teed the ball inwards to Eddie Hodge. Eddie Hodge's shot from 25 yards flew like an arrow into the top left corner and would have graced any game at any level.

Hamworthy were now well on top. A little later, Hodge's cross skimmed the top of the bar as it found touch. Cann and Matty Neale were then unable to convert good chances.

It was though courtesy of poor Shaftesbury defending that United doubled their lead on 33 minutes. Although visiting stopper Rowan Gravin was having a fine match, his short ball forward to Morgan Browning from a back pass was not the best. Browning himself then got into a bit of a muddle, was robbed by Hodge, before catching the United man's leg for a clear penalty. Dan Cann's spot kick was not the best

either, but still found the bottom right of the net, with the keeper almost getting to it.

United keeper Shane Murphy, who so far had been little more than a spectator, proved his concentration, leaping to his right to push over a blistering effort by Jordan Matthews. This only punctuated the home team's dominance. On the stroke of half time, Gravin again saved well from Max Buckler after good work by Cann.

The Hammers gave themselves clear daylight when they netted another fine goal on 48 minutes. Beasley's pinpoint cross from the left teed up a simple header for Dan Cann positioned right in front of goal, duly put away.

With United now rampant, visiting keeper Gravin managed to keep the score at bay with some good blocks. He also showed commendable courage and anticipation to pluck the ball from the feet of the advancing James Guthrie played in by a measured long ball by captain Lee Francis.

It was no surprise when United bagged a fourth on 80 minutes. James Guthrie's cross was cleared by a defender, but only into the path of co-substitute James King who slammed the ball high into the far corner of the net.

Gravin made two more fine saves, but was powerless to stop United making it five on 88 minutes. Substitute Jamie Filkins found captain Lee Francis with some neat one touch football, who in turn found the net with a good finish.

Come the final whistle, the Hammers could feel well satisfied with this five-star performance. The fact that all their three substitutes played their part in the second half scoring also shows the quality of the squad in the depth.

Although the campaign is still in its infancy, both clubs had made encouraging starts, with neither team having tasted defeat in the league.

The Baffins' pitch, notorious for being flooded late on in the season, was in perfect condition for this game, and the Hammers came so close to capitalising on it in the first minute with some fine football that so nearly paid dividends. Dan Cann's splendid through ball put Eddie Hodge one-on-one with home stopper Charlie Searle. However, the keeper came out well, made himself big, and forced Hodge to dink the ball just wide of the far post. That miss in many ways was to set the tone of the first half. United were very effective in their build-ups, but were just unable to finish when the goal was at their mercy. In fact, they were unable to work Searle into making any serious saves.

The best of those chances fell to Cann on 11 minutes, but his shot was blocked by a defender for a corner. Baffins meanwhile were finding it hard to get past a very well marshalled Hamworthy defence. Despite however having much less sight of goal, they did twice manage to work Shane Murphy. On 26 minutes, a fine through ball picked up the run Rudi Blankson whose ferocious shot to the near post was well beaten out by the United keeper. Then, on 44 minutes, a deft back-header set up a golden chance for Nathan Kirby. Helped by dogged defending by Max Buckler, Murphy finally claimed the ball, but not before jarring his knee in a brave tussle with his opponent. Fortunately, Murphy was able to continue after treatment. The Hammers, would have the strong wind in their favour in the second half, so certainly knew that three points were there for the taking. However, they must have also known they would have to be much more clinical in front of goal.

Ironically for Hamworthy, having missed so many chances of their own in the first half, it needed a Baffins' man to open their account on

49 minutes. After a good advantage played by the referee, Hodge put in what seemed no more than a hopeful low cross from the right. Josh Warren however, in attempting to clear, sliced the ball high and wide past his keeper, and into the net. Not for the first time this season, an early second half goal breathed fire into United's attack, and a minute later a high stinging effort from Cann on the bounce was well stopped by Searle.

The Hammers remained in control and duly doubled their lead on 59 minutes. Tony Rolls won a good tackle just inside the Baffins' half. The ball broke kindly to Cann, and he in turn picked out Beasley's run down the left. Beasley's low cross, via a neat dummy by Cann, was then slammed into the bottom left corner of the net from six yards by Eddie Hodge. A now rampant United netted a third on 64 minutes. Following a push on Cann, Matty Neale's floated in a free kick, from some thirty yards out. This was met by Adam Costello who rose high above his defender to head the ball high into the right corner of the net with some with aplomb. It was no surprise when the Hammers bagged their fourth on 71 minutes. Cann saw a fierce low shot rebound off Charlie Williamson, only for Eddie Hodge to rifle the ball into the net from ten yards.

Although Hamworthy did then take their foot of the gas a little until the final whistle, they were still making decent chances and might have added another before the end. Baffins meanwhile did not give up, but appeared to be driven now more by their own agitation, but were looking a little bereft of actual ideas. This was another all-round very solid performance by Hamworthy, the healthy competition for places motivating each player to produce that little bit extra to keep the shirt. The result enabled them to leapfrog their opponents into a very satisfactory fourth place, with games in hand.

The club was formed in 2011 following the amalgamation of two successful Sunday league clubs Baffins Milton and Milton Rovers. Both clubs had won several league and cup titles in the Portsmouth Dockyard and Meon Valley leagues.

The new club joined the Premier Division of the Portsmouth Saturday League and were champions in their first season. After finishing as Premier Division runners-up the following season, they moved up to the Senior Division of the Hampshire Premier League.

Baffins Milton Rovers were Hampshire Premier League champions in their first season in the league. They also won the League Cup with a 4-0 win over Colden Common in the final, and the Portsmouth Senior Cup, beating Moneyfields 4-0 in the final at Fratton Park. After finishing as Senior Division runners-up in 2014-15, the club were champions again in 2015-16, as well as winning the Portsmouth Senior Cup for a second time after beating Havant & Waterlooville 3-1 in the final.

As Hampshire Premier League champions and having moved to their new Kendall Stadium, Baffins were promoted to Division One of the Wessex League for the 2016-17 season.

They went on to finish as runners-up in the division, earning promotion to the Premier Division, as well as reaching the Wessex League Cup final, eventually losing 2-1 to Premier Division Sholing.

The 2018/19 season saw Hamworthy finish sixth to Baffins Milton Rovers' fifth on goal difference in a tight finish to the season.

Baffins Milton Rovers are a local club with 100% players living within the Portsmouth area and funded by Portsmouth businesses, controlled and operated from people within the Portsmouth area - a community club.

SUPPORTING NON-LEAGUE?

The pressure is on League clubs across the pyramid to survive this lockdown. With no fans in attendance and matches getting underway.

The club's fear total collapse, bankruptcy or even the implications of what happens if the season doesn't really getting going... financially. However, they also know that the hope of a percentage of fans returning isn't going to be the saviour of their clubs. Only the return of full stands, full bars and the sound of the tills ringing will stop the bleeding.

The calls for financial support to the government will get heard (at some point), as too many clubs gambled on the financial return of fans for October. We've seen clubs invest heavily into their playing squads, with the idea that money will return sooner than later. Last weekend saw the potential of National

League clubs pulling out of the FA Cup, in order to ultimately save money, but really to highlight their cause with a bigger threat. The prize money involved with the FA Cup, although halved, is still one of the only incomes that can be achieved this side of Christmas. We've seen in the last two weeks clubs in Wales and the Channel Islands have to abandon their whole seasons to comply with the COVID19 guidance.

One thing clubs seem to be overlooking is the fans themselves. We've seen it before or even been there ourselves, once a Season Ticket holder relinquishes their annual commitment they often go to very few games in the following season. Clubs should be very wary of this fact as they look to return with limited crowds. They maybe seeing 30% as a positive, but the other 70% is what they should be worried about.



'Innovative' schemes such as ticket raffles or predetermined matches picked for fans, have all been mooted or even trialled at some levels. However these fans of league clubs without tickets could actually be the saviours of other clubs. Keeping those fans 'warm' for their return to their own club when called upon.

It's not very often a 'tourist' fan will become loyal to another club by visiting every other week. If you've been following a club for life and usually you are able to pick up a ticket without the fear of missing out, then the risk of fans going to other club games is actually quite minimal.

Then there's the kids to consider, so many at this time not getting involved or having the chance to emulating their teams heroes. It's definitely not the same watching football on the television regardless of the empty seats and fake crowd sounds. How do we not lose a generation of kids? Many will no longer wish to go to games, as their adventures on Minecraft or Fortnite take hold. The bonding between young fans and the players, as well as the

clubs, will always be one of the key factors in falling in love with this real life game.

The league clubs should be reaching out to their local non-league sides. Taking the initiative to start building relationships to keep their fans engaged and watching live football. You only need to look at the attendance levels across Steps 3 and 4. Currently teams can have up to 600 or 400 fans, a quick look shows clubs aren't not just selling out, but some still only getting 100 fans through the gate lower than pre-lockdown. The awareness of the possibility of getting to watch live football in your local areas, could see all these games safely sell out with the support of the bigger teams in each local area.

I've long been a champion, that clubs in each area should be working together in partnership off the field. The rivalries remain on the football field, but the bigger challenge is for the industry to keep football fans engaged during this uncertain time.
