In the run up to a difficult test against Amesbury Town, we caught up with the luxury saloon this week to discuss all things Hammers:

What's the biggest, football related difficulty you've faced throughout the last six months and during lockdown?

When you're away from the game for so long, the most difficult task is getting a feel for the football again, as things like your first touch can really suffer.

However, being forced away from football also helped motivate me to try and push myself to the limit in preparation for the season, as it did many of the other lads, and in turn we've set bigger targets this

What's changed at the club when looking back on last season, and what have you learnt as a team and as an individual?

The main thing has been a few positive changes in personnel, all of whom have started brightly and bring good experience to the squad.

They've brought a lot into the dressing room and are all winners which has made a huge impact. It's also allowed the boss to bring in his ideas from the start, rather than halfway through, because the squad has the ability to fulfil whatever he asks, right from the get-go.

We've come into the season fitter. stronger, and more driven to succeed than in the past.

What's your biggest quality as a footballer?

That's a difficult one because I'm always looking at areas to improve rather than areas I'm already accomplished in. I'd say I'm quite calm when passing out from the back and am capable of setting off the team in offensive positions.

I feel I'm a player that gives my all and I enjoy challenging myself. In every battle I face, I go in with the attitude that I'm going to win it.

Are there any areas you'd like to improve?

As I said, I'm always looking to improve my game as a player. At the moment I'm desperately trying to stay injury free as there always seems to be some sort of set-back I face... I actually suffered a dead leg in the last game against Fleet, so I'm hoping to have recovered by Tuesday.

During lockdown I worked hard on my flexibility, which I hope will play its part in keeping me fit for the duration of this season

How would you rate Hamworthy's / your personal campaign thus far?

As a team we've been excellent. we're much more solid this season in comparison to ones past. We're motivated we can keep this positive form going and there's a great mood from everyone in

I think the staff deserve huge credit, they do so much behind the scenes all of which is crucial when stitching together a good performance.

On a personal note, I feel I've started well but am continually looking to better my performances week on week.

On fire Hamworthy were finally forced to change their line-up, Jamie Filkins stepping in for the suspended Max Buckler. Connor Cocklin returned to the bench, sufficiently recovered from his lengthy rib injury.

United needed a win to stay in the mix at the top of the table, and, on recent form, Alresford looked easy pickings after their unusually indifferent start. The Magpies however have shown a fine league pedigree in recent years and normally give United a tough game. Both teams struggled to find their feet early on with no clear chances at either end. The first shot on target fell to the hosts on 16 minutes. A fine long ball from Matty Neale found Eddie Hodge in space, whose attempted lob was easily caught by the Town keeper Aaron Bufton.

The visitors however soon shocked United by snatching a 22nd minute lead. Louis Russell managed weave his way past Declan Randall along the left bye-line, before slipping the ball across to his captain Ashley Elson to poke into the net from close range. The Hammers responded positively and were back on terms on 38 minutes with a picture goal. Neale's long corner was nodded back in by Randall, setting up a free header for captain Lee Francis, which forcefully found the back of the net. It took only a further three minutes for United to score again and claim the lead. Following a headed clearance from a corner, Dan Cann won a good challenge on the left. The United danger man then whipped in a cross to Neale who slotted the ball through to Jamie Beasley unmarked in the six-yard box to fire home. Remarkably, the Hammers' sudden scoring spree continued. Jamie Beasley was almost on the far-left byeline, and was surrounded by opposition players when he received the ball back from his own pass. His options seemed very limited, but, after cutting in a few paces, he somehow

squeezed the ball just inside the far upright for his second and United's third.

The second period started with vigor, Francis for the hosts and Daryll Phillips for the visitors saw fierce shots pass very close to the post. Francis then saw his header well held following a good United move. It was the Magpies however who reduced the arrears on 55 minutes. Ashley Elson will go down in the books as the scorer, but all the credit must go to surely Louis Russell. After the Hammers lost the ball near the half way line, Russell's long darting run, in from the left, finally presented an easy tap in to his colleague, who was found spare in the six-yard box. The Town were now starting to look much more dangerous in attack, with Shane Murphy making two fine saves.

At the other end, following a United break, Beasley somehow put an easy chance over the bar following a ricochet off the keeper. United must have been relieved to find the net again on 73 minutes. Neale won the ball deep in Alresford territory and slipped it into the path of Dan Cann, who planted the ball home just to the left of the exposed keeper. The Hammers, now took control and began to produce the football they are capable of. Neale soon smashed a cross from Hodge against the upright, before the same player ended a fine inter-passing move putting his effort just wide; when it looked easier to score. Late on, Francis's stooped header from another Hodge cross just cleared the far post, after which substitutes James Guthrie and Cam Munn both drew good saves. The Hammers finally achieved the three points they expected and remain third, but a spirited Alresford certainly at times took the game to them and United knew that they had been in a match.

FROM THE ARCHIVES - Saturday 25th October 2014



The Hammers locked horns against the Town on unfamiliar territory - their own County Ground, following six games on the road.

The Blues had made a fine start in their Wessex Division One campaign, one level below that of United, so the Hammers could take nothing for granted. United welcomed new signings Lewis Cook from Christchurch, and Callum Charlton from Bournemouth Sports. John Macy stood in for manager Stewart Kearn who was on holiday.

Kick-off was preceded by a minute's silence for the passing of Georgina Bartlett, mother of Club Chairman Mark Bartlett, who was always a popular figure at the County Ground. Once the game got underway, it was the Blues who looked the livelier team, and opened the scoring on eight minutes. Danny Finnigan slipped a through pass to Eddie Perrett who buried the ball into the net past the unprotected United stopper Gerard Benfield. United were levelled the score on the half hour. Town goalkeeper Paddy Creese rather impetuously rushed out to deal with a Greg Horlock forward ball. This left Russell Cook clear of the Town defence, and with the easy decision to lob the ball over him and into the unquarded net.

The first period was generally disappointing for the Hammers. Russell Cook however showed some good sparks, and drew Creese into one fine save, and a late Dominic Allen scuffed effort was pushed onto the post. It was the visitors who competed harder for the loose ball and looked the more eager to win. The Town tended to feed onto their lively centre forward Danny Finnigan who was proving quite a handful for the United defence.

The Blues continued to look the more threatening after the interval and regained the lead on 53 minutes. Finnigan was picked out by Chis Ward who sliced through on the left-hand side of the United defence before slipping the ball past the exposed Benfield. The Hammers did manage to equalize again five minutes later. The unmarked Callum Charlton stabbing in Russell Cook's pinpoint cross from two yards out. However, this only seemed to inspire the visitors who netted three late goals to secure an emphatic win.

On 80 minutes, United's right full back Dan Blackburn, who admittedly was playing away from his preferred central midfield position, hashed a back pass. It was intercepted by Chris Ward who touched the ball onto Eddie Perrett, who then darted through the defence to beat Benfield. A few minutes later. Perrett's fine sortie on the left picked out substitute Cameron Roach with a hard-low cross. The Town player stooped down low to head into the net. In the dying minutes. Perrett secured his hat-trick, this time by beating Benfield from a narrow angle, and after again being allowed to waltz in from the left following good work by Ward and Finnigan.

This match, which started in sombre circumstances, must rank as a bad day at the office for the lethargic Hammers, who usually at least put up a fight when going down. One had to feel sympathy for their young goalkeeper Gerard Benfield who conceded five, but could do very little about any of them. At least the only way for United now is up after this forgettable lacklustre encounter.

The club was established in 1904 as Amesbury Football Club. They joined the Salisbury & District Junior League, before becoming members of the Salisbury & District League in 1906. After winning the league in 1955-56, they became members of Division One of the Wiltshire League. However, after finishing third in Division One in 1958-59, the club left the division. They returned to Division One in 1972-73: despite finishing bottom of the table, they were not relegated. The following season saw them finish second-frombottom of the division, but in 1974-75 they were league champions. They were runners-up the following season, and were placed in Senior Division One in 1976 after the league merged with the Wiltshire Combination to form the Wiltshire County League.

Amesbury began entering the FA Vase in 1978–79 and were Division One runners-up. The following season saw them win the league and reach the third round of the Vase. In 1983–84 they won the Wiltshire Senior Cup for the first time. The club were renamed Amesbury Town in 1984 and after finishing second in 1989–90, they were champions in 1990–91. They retained the league title in 1991–92, and after finishing as runners-up in 1993–94, also winning the Wiltshire Senior Cup, the club moved up to Division One of

the Western League. However, after finishing bottom of Division One in 1996–97 they left to rejoin the Salisbury & District League.

After finishing as runners-up in the Salisbury & District League Premier Division in 1997-98, Amesbury joined Division Three of the Hampshire League. A fourth-place finish in their first season in the league was enough to earn promotion to the Premier Division amidst league reorganisation. In 2004 the league merged into the Wessex League, with the club becoming members of Division Two. which was renamed Division One in 2006. In 2015-16 they were Division One runners-up, and were promoted to the Premier Division. After finishing third-from-bottom of the Premier Division in 2017-18, the club were relegated back to Division One.

Last season saw the Blues secure a 2nd place finish that led to bounce straight back into this division.

FANS ARE WHAT NON LEAGUE CLUBS CRAVE

With the hospitality and events industries still on their knees amid the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, smaller lower and non-league clubs are finding themselves in more treacherous waters day by day, with a lack of support and income making running a football team nigh impossible.

English football first ground to a halt in mid-march following an array of positive tests from professional footballers and managers, while fans have still not yet been allowed back into stadiums in a bid from the government to limit close contact between people. However, as time goes on the financial affects are becoming increasingly irreversible for lower and non-league clubs such as FC Oswestry Town, who were forced to fold four months into the pandemic:

"The difficult decision has been made due mainly to the Covid pandemic that resulted in the curtailing of the North West Counties League and the FA's ruling to make the 2019/20 season null and void which robbed us of a hard-earned promotion.

"Financial difficulties due to the denial of promotion to a higher league, no fixtures being played since March and no opportunities to raise funds externally means we are in no position to commit to the forthcoming season."

In order to stop the regularity of clubs being forced to fold, the people have taken action, mainly in the form of the '#LetFansIn' campaign aimed at reintroducing spectators to football stadiums, in turn offering a financial

lifeline to clubs.

The campaign invites the government to take action within the game of football and endeavour to find a safe way of allowing people back into stadiums; something already achieved within the game of cricket, with approximately 1000 spectators allowed into the oval to enjoy the Surrey vs Middlesex two day friendly in late July, a decision which has angered many struggling clubs such as Havant and Waterlooville:

"Non-League football desperately needs fans back in the ground. Clubs at our level and below cannot survive without supporters in the ground and it is nonsensical that cricket games can be played with spectators in next to football matches who can't.

We implore that this is looked into immediately and should the health factors deem it safe to do so we should #LetFansIn."

In addition to the money spectators would naturally pay to watch a game through ticket sales, should the campaign see spectators allowed back into stadiums, fans will also be relied upon to 'help out' on match days, through encouragement to make purchases from the club bar, merchandise store and picking yourself up a programme.

Furthermore, many fans are also being offered to buy their season tickets for the 2020/21 season early, with the sizeable sum of money potentially embodying the difference between life and death for some clubs at this testing time. Additionally, if supporters begin purchasing their season tickets now it could help persuade others to do the same, with the worry of missing out increasing proactivity.

With the UK now out of lockdown and normal life seemingly back on track, aside from a few changes aimed at decreasing transmission rates, surely there's a safe way to reintroduce fans back into football stadiums? Prime Minister Boris Johnson recently revealed that when fans are allowed back into footballing venues, there may be restrictions on "chanting", which could damage the entertainment factor of watching a live game, theoretically making watching live football a less desirable leisure activity for people, which wouldn't help in the long run.

The introduction of mandatory masks in shops could be extended into football stadiums, protective plastic barriers could be erected between seats, social distancing could be achieved; the longer the government delay the reintroduction of fans while trying to develop complex initiatives aimed at a "safe return", the deeper the wounds become for football clubs.

The young Hammers remain top of the Dorset Youth League going into next weekend's fixture away at Sherborne Town.




